It is hoped that this seminar will be a platform for exchanging ideas, which will lead to collaborative research and joint efforts in promoting tropical medicine and parasitology. We fervently hope you can join us in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia for this seminar and are looking forward to welcome you.



The Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (UK)


The Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene has a distinguished history. The Society was founded in 1907 by Sir James Cantlie and Dr George Carmichael Low to study diseases met with in tropical countries. Sir Patrick Manson, the Society's first President (1907-9) is generally acknowledged as the 'father of tropical medicine'. He passed the presidency on to Sir Ronald Ross (1909-11), discoverer of the role of mosquitoes in the transmission of malaria. Since that time, many of the most distinguished practitioners and researchers in the field of tropical medicine have been fellows of the Society.

In 1920, King George V gave his permission for the Society to use the Royal prefix. Her Majesty the Queen is Patron of the Society and Her Royal Highness, the Princess Royal is an Honorary Fellow. For over 70 years, regular meetings of the Society were held in Manson House, 26 Portland Place, London (designed by Robert Adam), but in 2004 Manson House was sold and the offices of the Society moved to 50 Bedford Square, London. Meetings are now held at venues across London and in regional centres.

An important activity of the Society has been the production of its journal, the Transactions of the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene which has been published regularly since 1907. This journal has reported many major discoveries in tropical medicine and maintains a high reputation in the field.

Although many of the classical tropical diseases, such as malaria, continue to cause many deaths and much ill health, the pattern of illness in many poor, developing countries is changing with an increasing incidence of non-communicable diseases. The Society is responding to these changes with an increasing focus at its meetings and in its journal on the overall health problems of poor societies in the developing world and on how to tackle these using a multi-disciplinary approach. The rich world is, at last, coming to the conclusion that the gap in health between its populations and those of the poorest countries of the world is no longer acceptable and funds are being made available to bridge this gap. The Society, with nearly 100 years of experience of work in the developing world, is in a strong position to help to ensure that these new resources are spent wisely and well.

The Malaysian Society of Parasitology and Tropical Medicine

The formation of the Society was conceived in 1962 at the UNECSO-sponsored Regional Meeting on "Scientific Knowledge on Tropical Parasites" hosted by the Government of Singapore in November 1962. Professor R. S. Desowitz and his colleagues from the Department of Parasitology, University of Singapore, were responsible for its organization. A small committee was set up to draft a constitution for the formation of a local society of parasitologists.

The inaugural meeting of the Malaysian Society of Parasitologists (as it was then called), was convened at the Institute for Medical Research, Kuala Lumpur on the 10th January 1964. The constitution was approved and the first Council was elected. Dr. A. A. Sandosham was elected as the first President of the Society. The scientific programmes at the beginning consisted of laboratory demonstrations in parasitology which was set up at 6-monthly intervals alternating between Singapore and Kuala Lumpur held under the auspices of the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene, London and later undertaken solely by our Society.

The scope and range of activities of the Society gradually expanded and its membership increased. Along with the laboratory demonstrations meetings, talks on various aspects of parasitology were introduced. These were enlarged in scope and range of interest to half-yearly seminars with several papers being presented and discussed. With the growing interest in the applied aspects of parasitology in medicine and veterinary practice in the tropics, the name of the society was changed to the "Malaysian Society of Parasitology and Tropical Medicine".

The notes on demonstrations set up at the laboratory meetings were initially published in the Transactions of the Royal Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene and later selectively published in the Southeast Asian Journal of Tropical Medicine and Public Health. Subsequently, abstracts were published in the Medical Journal of Malaya, the Singapore Medical Journal, the Malaysian Veterinary Journal, and the Thai Medical Journal. In 1984, the Society began the publication its own peer-reviewed journal – Tropical Biomedicine. This journal was recently accepted for indexing in MEDLINE.
